# Family Honours Son's Memory through Hike for Hospice

Patrick Mackey was a healthy and vibrant young Peterborough man known for his passion for social justice, his easygoing nature and his work at the YMCA as a beloved camp counsellor with the nickname 'Toucan.'

After his first year of attending the University of Guelph to study biomedical engineering, he started getting terrible headaches and his family soon learned he had glioblastoma, an aggressive form of brain cancer. Despite radiation that shrunk the tumour, relieved his pain and provided hope, Patrick lost his battle nearly two years later while spending his final days with his family at home in palliative care. He was 20.

There's no way to make sense of such a loss but one of the most important ways the family was able to cope was by using the services of Hospice Peterborough.

"I knew we needed family support and counselling and so I called Hospice and (bereavement coordinator) David Kennedy was here the next day," says Patrick's mother Christine Mackey, a retired long-time teacher from the local Catholic board. "He worked with us for a year and a half afterward, especially during difficult days like birthdays and Christmas, and he gave incredible insight and put things into perspective. We came away feeling like we could move forward." Knowing the importance of this community service, Christine and her family – husband Pat and daughters Kira and Brianna – put together the 'Paddy's Paddlers' team this year as part of the 18<sup>th</sup>annual Hike for Hospice fundraiser.

In all, the Hike exceeded its goal of \$35,000 to bring in \$56,538, which supports 26 programs and services including grief groups, day hospice, a 10bed end-of-life residence and groups for children and teens. Christine says she's happy to support Hospice knowing that all of these programs and services are offered free of charge and Hospice depends on the generosity of the community, and these types of fundraisers, to continue.

But the Hike is more about raising money, it's also about honouring the lives of loved ones.

Christine thinks back to raising her three children on Croftdale Crescent before moving to Haggis Drive in the west end and Patrick, her youngest, being a happy and easygoing child who always laughed and smiled. "He brought us so much joy," she says.

He attended St. Catherine's elementary school and Holy Cross Secondary School where he was known for working on student council, attending brigades to Honduras where he supported orphanages and eventually becoming school valedictorian.

After moving on to university, he studied biomedical engineering with the hope of using his education to support third-world countries.

The headaches started in July 2016 while he was home for the summer break. After going to the Peterborough Regional Health Centre in early August, a CT scan discovered a tumour.

Eventually, doctors at Princess Margaret and Toronto Western hospitals treated the tumour with radiation and chemotherapy and Patrick was feeling well enough to go back to school in January 2017. (continued on next page)

Later that year, however, the cancer had spread. After learning in April 2018 that he would be in palliative care for several weeks, the entire family was able to come home and spend that time together. As well as tremendous support and love from family, friends and school communities, Christine says Hospice offered "life-changing" counselling and services to the family during the palliative care and afterward.

With thanks, the family is now giving back to Hospice.

The Mackey's not only joined this year's Hike but plan to participate in the annual fundraiser for many years to come.

Unfortunately, they know many families after them will need the same services.

"Every family is affected by cancer and the new Hospice (building) is absolutely beautiful – so warm and welcoming with gardens and a courtyard – and you can just feel the compassion and sense of family when you walk in there," Christine says. "We are so fortunate, in Peterborough, to have that."

She adds that while joining the Hike is to financially support this important community organization, it's also one more way to honour Patrick's life.

"We continue to honour the incredible life he lived," she says, "and all of his goodness."

# Hospice Peterborough's COVID-19 Update

We are so proud to be a part of a community that rallies together to flatten the curve, allowing Hospice Peterborough to enter phase 3 of our Pandemic Re-opening Plan.


Changes are being introduced slowly and Hospice assist in coordinating these types of visits. Peterborough continues to follow the expert advice Additional visitors may be allowed in the last hours

of Public Health professionals, and direction from the Ministry of Health. We vigilantly monitor changes daily and decisions continue to be made with the safety of clients, residents, families, staff, and the community at large as our top priority.

Most support programs and palliative navigation will continue to take place virtually or over the phone, with home or in-person visits offered only by following a decision tree to ensure screening and safety measures can be followed.

Programs that involve gatherings of individuals most at risk, such as our Day Hospice groups, will remain virtual. Group meeting areas are closed and the heightened cleaning and sanitization procedures remain in place throughout the building.

Although we miss our volunteers terribly, some volunteer activities are still on hold. We are carefully restarting low risk volunteer activities.



Visitor restrictions are adjusted weekly. All visitors and staff are screened daily as they enter the building. Visitors are also able to meet with loved ones virtually or from the courtyard through a window as the weather permits. Staff are happy to assist in coordinating these types of visits. Additional visitors may be allowed in the last hours

of life, and at the discretion of our Medical Director and Manager of Residence.

Frontline and residence staff are equipped with proper Personal Protective Equipment including masks, face shields, gloves, and gowns. Nonfrontline staff continue to work mostly from home, with the option of time, scheduled ahead, in the office. Social distancing, wearing masks, and screening procedures extend to all staff as they enter the building.

We have been so moved by the community's response during this pandemic which has allowed us to continue to support those living with a life-threatening illness, at the end of life, and dealing with grief.

While life goes on, so does death, and we are still here for those who need our care and support.
