In the absence of being able to be gather in this time when the days grow colder and darker, we hope this collection of doves and light will allow all in the community to come together in peace and safety.

Hospice Peterborough Board Chair Shares Personal Experience with Hospice After Facing Grief

Each of us is dealing with significant loss. Individually and together, we now face our mortality against the reality of a global pandemic. We grieve uniquely.

My grief is multi-layered. The death of a child is every parent's worst nightmare... it certainly is mine. It has been almost a year since my Daughter's death – pain and sadness is beginning to ease through the love and support of family and friends. A few months later came COVID-19, and our family endured two more deaths, three months apart. Both times we would be robbed of personal contact, physical support, and the rituals of saying goodbye. Participating in two funerals in the same afternoon was heart-wrenching.

This past year has been overwhelming, and painful, and I'm grateful for the help of Hospice
Peterborough. I credit skilled staff and volunteers for supporting me to find my way through grief, empowering me to be available and able to care for my wife, children, and 10 grandchildren.

For the past six years, I have had the privilege of volunteering with Hospice Peterborough. This experience has taught me so much about life and death. I know firsthand that hospice care is a lifeline for people in our community facing end-of-life, life-threatening illness and grief – especially with the increased isolation that has come with the pandemic and its required safety protocols.

Thanks to Hospice, I was able to support my Brother-in-law as he was dying, cope with my Mother-in-law's sudden death, and look ahead after my Daughter's tragedy.

I have a deep appreciation of hospice care, now more than ever – as a client, donor, volunteer, and as the Chair of the Board of Directors.

Clearly COVID-19 has brought death and dying closer to us all, globally. In this extraordinary time in history, hospice palliative care is even more relevant and essential.

Thanks to donors like YOU and me, all hospice programs and services are continuing to be offered throughout the pandemic - at no charge. Our family, like others, will not have to face the additional financial burden of accessing or paying for this life-changing help and care.



One hospice client, facing a life-threatening illness, shares what hospice support means to her:

"When I think of my hospice group, I know it's been a life line for me and many others.

COVID has been so isolating. Without the group, we would all be really struggling. I look forward to it every week – it gives me a reason to shower and get dressed. If we didn't have each other, who would we lean on? It's too painful for my family to hear the details of my disease and how I really feel, but not the group – they get it!"

The impact of COVID-19 has not been equitable. For many hospice clients, time will run out during COVID-19 restrictions. No last bucket list items, no last celebrations – and many will not see the end of the pandemic.

This next year will take strong leadership, dedicated staff and volunteers, and YOU. With your gift, we will walk alongside those living with a life-threatening illness, at end-of-life, and those grieving.

Our family credits Hospice Peterborough for helping us in our healing journeys.


